WHY STUDENTS SHOULD VOLUNTEER

It saves resources. Volunteering provides valuable community services so more money can be spent on local improvements.

Volunteers gain experience. You can work near your ideal career field and learn basic soft skills with the people you work with.

It brings people together. As a volunteer you assist in: Uniting people from different backgrounds to work toward a common goal and promoting teamwork.

It promotes personal growth and self-esteem. Understanding community needs helps foster empathy and self-efficacy.

Volunteering strengthens your community. As a volunteer you help:

- Support families (daycare and eldercare)
- Improve schools (tutoring, literacy)
- Support youth (mentoring and after-school programs)
- Clean the community (beaches, parks, etc.)

You learn a lot. Volunteers learn things like these:

- Self: Volunteers discover hidden talents that may change your view on yourself worth.
- Government: Through working with local non-profit agencies, volunteers learn about the functions and operation of our government.
- **Community**: Volunteers gain knowledge of local resources available to solve community needs.

You get a chance to give back. People like to support community resources that they use themselves or that benefit people they care about.

Volunteering encourages civic responsibility. Community service and volunteerism are an investment in our community and the people who live in it.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR COMMUNITY SERVICE

Did you know that your extracurricular activities can earn you money for college?

In particular, there are a lot of scholarships available to students who have chosen to spend their free time helping out others in their communities through volunteer work.

If you're the type of person who spends your free time helping others, you probably already know about some of the benefits of this type of work: you get to make a positive impact in your community while getting life experience that will help you develop as a person.

But you may not have been aware that there's another potential benefit: community service is also a great way to earn some extra cash for college. Many universities and organizations value individuals who they think will make a difference in the world, and offering scholarships to students who have dedicated their time to improving the lives of others is one way that they can contribute to those changes.

There are a lot of different kinds of community service scholarships, and they come from a lot of different sources, including charities, the government, religious groups, and universities themselves. Some of the scholarships offered will help fund tuition costs, while others will help you pay for charitable projects that you want to organize or give you the opportunity to do more volunteer work.

Though you may not have seen many of these scholarships advertised, there are hundreds of them out there.

A good resource is the college and financial aid counselors at your high school, who may know of local and national opportunities, as well as scholarships related to volunteer programs at your school.

Additionally, ask the organizations where you volunteer if there are any scholarships available. Quite frequently, churches, religious groups, hospitals, and other community clubs and organizations provide awards to help students with the cost of education. Highschool clubs like NHS and Key Club can also offer scholarship opportunities for students with their service.

The Bright Futures Scholarships is probably the most beneficial state-wide scholarship for all Floridians that can be acquired through community service. Here is the information regarding the requirements for Bright Futures:

Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program Florida Academic Scholars (FAS)/Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS) 2025-26

- 1. Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31after high school graduation.
- 2. Graduated from a Florida high school with a standard high school diploma or its equivalent.
- 3. Complete the required high school coursework for admission to a state university.
- 4. Achieve the required minimum high school grade point average (GPA)
- 5. Achieve the required minimum score on either the ACT, CLT, or SAT college entrance exam. Tests accepted through August 31 of high school graduation year
- 6. Complete the required number of volunteer service, paid work hours, or the combination of 100 total hours.
